Business vs. private mileage: How vehicle tracking helps with tax compliance



For most companies with vehicle tracking installed in their fleet, all miles recorded are business miles. However, there are many companies whose vehicles are driven for both business and personal use, and it becomes necessary to clearly define which miles fall into each category.

As an employer offering the use of vehicles to employees, a very important step to ensuring HMRC compliance involves something called 'benefit-in-kind' tax.

What is a 'benefit-in-kind'?

Private use of a company vehicle is a benefitin-kind. For example, when an employee drives a company car for private use. Here, mileage capture is vital, as is being able to validate locations travelled to as either personal or business trips.

Benefit-in-kind means two things for employers:

- Commuting to your permanent place of work is classed as private use if you drive a company vehicle. Employees must pay income tax on the value of this benefit, including instances when the vehicle was used outside of company hours for personal reasons.
- Fuel is a taxable benefit. When fuel is free to the employee or subsidised by the company, it must be recorded for HMRC. Any fuel that is used for business mileage, versus private mileage, must be recorded clearly in company records.

What happens if you fail to record this?

HRMC regularly penalises companies that fail to pay the proper tax revenue, meaning it's imperative to precisely declare any benefits-in-kind. In fact, employers can be fined thousands of pounds per annum per employee for incorrect tax returns. Relying on manual records for HMRC audits can present huge risks.

How can you ensure compliance?


One way to simplify this task is by employing vehicle tracking. You can ensure HRMC compliance by recording detailed information for your business automatically via a GPS tracking device that can mark trips as business or private. Vehicle tracking systems can easily provide:


- Types of trip (business or private) This
 is crucial information in terms of tax
 compliance as it will determine if the miles
 are taxable or not.
- Mileage information Quickly determines how much tax will be due.
- Dates and locations The system will provide reliable, recorded evidence of the journeys.

Configuring business/private miles with Quartix

The distinction between business or private miles can be set up via the Quartix website or on the Quartix mobile app. On the website, you can configure each of your vehicles, so that trips are recorded as private at certain times. For example, if you know that your drivers are using company vehicles on weekends for personal use, those miles must be recorded for the HMRC, but you may wish to set all weekend use to 'unmonitored'—the mileage will be recorded, but with no identifying information, for the sake of your drivers' privacy. On the mobile app, you and your drivers can alter the settings of trips that have already been recorded. Access this feature through the "Trips" tab and each trip will have a tick box where you, or the driver themselves, can set the journey details to private, retrospectively. Since commuting counts as private use, drivers can identify the trips to and from the office or job site and mark those as private, while other trips taken on the same day can be classified as "business." If drivers mistakenly use the incorrect key fob, then they are still able to retrospectively amend the journey type for their vehicle, via the password-protected Quartix website or the mobile app. That will update the Quartix trip reporter, which allows us to see the final mileage summary breakdown for all our drivers on the website or through an email allowing us to make the necessary deductions for private journeys.

We have also utilised Quartix's API for business journey data only so live vehicle location and trip data is pulled into our back-office scheduling system, to help our team allocate resource more effectively. This also allows us to generate our own internal Engineer Shift reporting. Our approach ensures a fast, effective and robust way for us to distinguish between drivers' business and private journeys, whilst ensuring restricted access to drivers private mileage data. Only those departments that have a legitimate business interest in viewing the data will be able to see it."
